**DID YOU KNOW .....**

**“Ironing”**

When I took my first quilt class, I was surprised at the amount of ironing that goes into assembling a quilt. And that one reason almost ended my quilting career! My favorite part of quilting at that time was picking a pattern and buying the fabric :)! But, I have come to the point of respecting the part ironing plays in quilt creation and I have found a couple of tips to make ironing easier and a bit more enjoyable.

First, I learned that the ironing board surface should be about four inches below your arm bent at a right angle. I measured my board and it was 11 inches below my arm!!! I’m almost 5’9” so, my board got jacked up! For \$9.99, I purchased bed risers and placed them under my ironing board. The safety supervisor, my husband, isn’t too satisfied with my solution but the board is actually very stable.

Another tip I picked up was having a stool or a yoga block next to my ironing board. Putting either foot up on the block while I’m ironing puts less strain on my back. Something so small and easy has really helped.

Anti-fatigue mats have become very popular and can be found in many homes. They come in many shapes/sizes and price ranges and really should be “tried out” before purchase. I’ve got one right in front of my ironing board and am going to purchase another one for my cutting table.

I have had four back surgeries and I love quilting. These tips have allowed me to quilt longer without as much pain. I actually find ironing soothing in a way now!

Anniversary Quilt Challenge***

**NOTE: We will hold an Anniversary Quilt Workshop on Zoom Monday, April 19 at 7pm.**

Our guild turns 40 years old in 2021 and it’s time to get started on our very special anniversary guild challenge. We are looking for 40+ quilters to make quilted wall-hangings to represent each year the guild has been in existence. Twenty-one of the years are already adopted. We still 19 more to reach our goal of quilting every year of our 40 years. Our theme is “Life in America: 40 Years of Star Quilters Guild” and we’d like you to choose a year between 1981 and 2021 to represent. (SEE THE AVAILABLE YEARS ON THE NEXT PAGE) You will make a small wall hang-

ing that represents a world, national, state, or local event that happened that year. You could also focus on the music or fashion of that year. Also add a little something to show us why that year is important to you (a child or grandchild was born, an anniversary of your own, maybe even the year you started quilting!). We've put some suggestions next to the years but you are NOT obligated to do any of these topics. You are welcome to come up with your own ideas to represent your year. **Here are some other things we need you to include:**

- The wall hanging must include a top, batting, and a backing. The wall hanging must be bound on all four sides. The piece must be quilted either by hand or machine.
- Any material or embellishments are accepted. Use your imagination! Transfer a non-copyrighted photo to fabric or add beads, laces, or trims. It's all up to you.
- You must include the number of the year on the front of the quilt in 3" numbers or larger. They may be fused, appliqued, or quilted on the wall hanging as long as they are very visible.
- The perimeter of the wall hanging must not exceed 81 inches (that's the year SQG started!) For example the wall hanging could be 20" wide by 20 1/2" long (20 + 20 + 20.5 +20.5=81) OR it could be 15" wide by 25 1/2" long (15 + 15 + 25.5 +25.5 =81)
- Please put a 4" deep sleeve on the back at the top for hanging.
- We hope everyone will follow through if they sign up to create a quilt for a particular year. We want to make sure we have all forty years represented. If we get all the years filled and have more quilters who want to make duplicate years, we'll be happy to have you. But we'd first like to get all forty years covered so we may ask you to pick another year.

**DEADLINES:** All wall hangings should be turned in at our SEPTEMBER 2021 SQG Meeting. Our anniversary month is OCTOBER, and we are planning a special unveiling of our "Life In America: 40 Years of Star Quilters Guild" exhibit. The guild would also like you to return these quilts for display in a special exhibit at our 2023 Quilt Show.

## Participating in My First Workshop via Zoom

I took the Colourwerx Colourbug workshop recently offered to Guild members via Zoom. I was expecting to be “neutral” in my assessment of the Zoom method – expecting that Zoom would work but I would prefer in-person teaching. How wrong I was! I totally loved the Zoom workshop! Here’s a few reasons why:

- Didn’t have to lug my sewing machine and other paraphernalia to the workshop site
- Could see the presenter perfectly as she instructed because Zoom has a feature called “speaker view”
- Could see clearly the various fabric pieces to be sewn together as the presenter laid out the pieces on her cutting board under her overhead camera
- No side conversations from other participants talking to each other while the instructor is speaking; all participants are on “mute” unless they are speaking (you know there are always two or three people in every workshop who are whispering among themselves!
- If I wanted, I could have left the workshop before it completed by using the “leave meeting” feature and not been a distraction to others gathering up my possessions

I am hoping this report on my reaction to my first Zoom workshop will encourage other Guild members to participate in future workshops offered by Zoom.


